The Alamo Scouts Association celebrated its Silver Anniversary at the 2005 Reunion in Kansas City. Although Bob Sumner and many other Scouts are gone, a number of originals made the yearly trek to celebrate friendship, family and fun. The following is a quick down and dirty of what occurred:

Wednesday

Terry Santos arrived Tuesday and spearheaded the check-in at the Hyatt Regency Crown Center. Despite a huge international convention of piano tuners and a confusing elevator system, the digs were outstanding.

At 1800 hours host Bob Shirkey arrived to see everyone onto the bus for a wonderful buffet at the Ameristar Casino. Reservations may be made through the general Sheraton toll free number of **1-866-500-8313**, however if anyone is planning to stay additional days and would like the discounted rate extended to those days, it is best to call the Sheraton Princess Kaiulani directly at **1-808-931-8111**.

****Important**** The latest date reservations can be made at the discounted rate is August 31, 2006. A one night deposit will be charged to your credit card with a 72 hour cancellation policy should you need to cancel before the event.

For those who wish to book their flight through a travel agent please contact: RoseAnne Grasser at **Aloha World Travel 1-800-434-3003**. She can assist you with your round trip air fare and hotel transfers. Let her know you are attending the Alamo Scout Reunion. If any of you are planning to extend your stay either on Oahu or our other Islands, RoseAnne is a great resource to helping you with your travel plans.

For those who will be booking your reservations on line don't forget to arrange for your hotel transfer to and from the airport. (Hint: RoseAnne is pretty good at coming in close to the internet prices)

It is not necessary to rent a car during the 4 days of the reunion. (parking at the hotel is expensive) There will be transportation arranged for all the Scout activities. (Except airport transfers) Should anyone need a rental car for extended days before or after the reunion you could arrange it with RoseAnne or book directly with a car agency.

TENTATIVE SCHEDULE:

Wednesday, October 4: Arrival and Check In. The hospitality room will be open--Dinner on your own.

Thursday or Friday morning: Pearl Harbor and Arizona Memorial tour followed by tour of the USS Missouri. Lunch at Seabreeze Restaurant on Hickam AFB. Still undecided on which day due to the logistics of working with the Navy.

Thursday evening, October 5: Outdoor Luau at the Hale Koa Hotel (military resort in Waikiki).

Friday evening, October 6: Reunion Banquet at the Hale Koa Resort.

Saturday, October 7: Bus tour to the windward part of the island with a catered lunch at Bellows AFB Beach and Recreational area. This half day event includes spectacular scenery on the way out and back and a chance for everyone to see what many consider the most beautiful part of this island. This event will start in the morning and end around mid afternoon in case any of you have evening flights out.

Sunday, October 8: Check Out.

This schedule leaves plenty of free time between events. Waikiki beach is directly across the street from our hotel and there are enough shops and restaurants to please everyone.

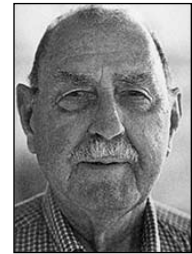

ALAMO SCOUT WAR DEATHS

The Alamo Scouts unbelievable record of never having lost a man killed or captured in over 106 missions behind enemy lines is arguably the finest in the history of the U.S. military, but at least ten FORMER Alamo Scouts and Overhead Personnel would die while serving with OTHER units before World War II ended. These men are listed below. Anyone having additional information or recollections of these men or others who died AFTER serving with the Alamo Scouts, please contact us. Families of some of the men have requested information.

BILL NELLIST REMEMBERED

My father was Stephen C. Sitter, a P.O.W. at Cabanatuan prison in January 1945. My family and I owe the Nellist and Rounsaville Teams and all of the Alamo Scouts for giving us another 14 years with my father. I cannot adequately express my everlasting gratitude for the job done by the Alamo Scouts.

My father was a career medical officer with his last duty assignment at Letterman Army Hospital at the Presidio of San Francisco. While still on active duty (probably around 1949-50), he saw Bill Nellist's name on patient admittance lists. Bill thought he had throat cancer (which he did not). Dad brought him to our quarters every night Bill was at Letterman and they reminisced. Dad would only talk about prison camp with someone that had been there, either a fellow P.O.W. or Ranger or Alamo Scout. Dad retired in 1951 on a 100% disability - thanks to the Japs - and we traveled to Eureka to spend time with the Nellist family a few times. Bill took me duck hunting for the first time ever...in a scull boat. I guess I was 11 or 12 at the time. We also camped in the Trinity National Forest. I would shoot ground squirrels with a .22 rifle. He would use a Colt Woodsman.

Dad and Bill would open a bottle of bourbon after dinner and start talking. That's when I heard the stories. Dad said that he happened to be standing outside when the raid began. Bill told about a man that was supposed to open the gate, which was usually unlocked. As the soldier approached it, he saw a padlock on it so he drew a .45. At that time a guard appeared and shot at the soldier, hitting his hand. The soldier picked up the .45 with his left hand and shot the guard. The guard tower was immediately hit. Dad said the prettiest sight he had seen in years was the dead guard dropping like a sack of rice. After the raid, a doctor was asked to stay behind with Capt. Fisher and the rear guard (Team Nellist). Dad, a peacetime entry into the Medical Corps, volunteered; and I can't imagine doing the same to this day. Bill threw Dad a .45 and a magazine and told him that that .45 might be all that was between him and the Japanese again, and if it came to that, save the last one for himself. Dad, the peacetime doctor, didn't know how to load a .45. Bill told me that story.

Backing up about 5 years, when Dad returned safely to Milwaukee, WI he took my brother Steve and I (I was 5, Steve 9) to a farm to learn to shoot a .22 rifle and pistol. I loved doing anything with the father I hadn't seen for four years, but never knew why we were shooting so much until Bill told that story. I spent two years in the 82nd, a year in VN with a Vietnamese Ranger Battalion and another year at Ft. Bragg. I hunt a lot, mostly birds now, but I have NEVER seen a man that mastered the rifle, shotgun and handgun like Bill Nellist.

Dad made Bill tell me about reconning the camp before the raid. He and another Scout walked down a road to an abandoned hut some distance (maybe 300 yards) from the camp perimeter dressed in native clothing. That must have been a trip. Bill was 6'2" or 6'3". and he had his M-1 Garand in his pant leg. Because he shot so much, he would sight through the rifle sights to estimate distance. The man had to be the coolest person under pressure. I used an M-1 a lot and it was my primary weapon in Viet Nam because it always worked, reached out a long ways and settled all disputes quickly. But I could never imagine duplicating Bill's efforts.

Again, I feel forever grateful for every Alamo Scout.

Stephen C. Sitter Citation for Bronze Star Medal:

"Lieutenant Colonel Stephen C. Sitter, a member of the hospital staff at Cabanatuan Prison Camp No. 1, Cabu, Nueva Ecija Province, Luzon, Philippine Islands, upon arrival at the assembly area for released prisoners on 30 January 1945, voluntarily remained overnight behind enemy lines to assist in giving care to a wounded medical officer and several sick military personnel, despite the danger of possible recapture by the enemy. Colonel Sitter's disregard for personal safety and his devotion to the sick were an inspiration to all who witnessed his brave act."

After helping to liberate 513 POWs during the raid on Cabanatuan, Nellist and Rounsaville Teams remained behind at barrio Balincari with critically wounded Ranger, Dr. James Fisher, and scores of prisoners who were either too weak or too sick to travel to American lines with the main body of prisoners. The Ranger commander (Mucci) promised to send a plane to evacuate Fisher, but after Filipinos and Alamo Scouts hacked out a makeshift landing strip during the night, the plane never arrived and Fisher died.
